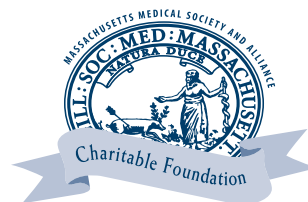

In May 2000, the Massachusetts Medical Society (MMS) House of Delegates established the MMS and Alliance Charitable Foundation as a supporting organization of the MMS. The Foundation, a not-for-profit 501(c)(3) organization, is a mechanism for consolidating the MMS’s charitable giving to the community into one entity, building on the activities of the former MMS Committee on Community Action and the MMS Alliance Charitable and Educational Fund.

The mission of the Foundation is to support the charitable and educational activities of the MMS and the MMS Alliance, including, but not limited to, developing and nurturing cooperation between individuals, professions, institutions, and the community to creatively address issues that affect the health, benefit, and welfare of the community.

Message from the Chair



Dear Friends and Colleagues,

I am excited to share with you highlights of what we have been able to accomplish this past year, because of the financial support and continued commitment from our donors to our mission of supporting physicians, patients, and communities.

This past year was a banner year for the Foundation. Our board worked diligently to refine and define our funding priorities and our grant application process has been streamlined and is now managed through an online grant portal. We increased our financial support of organizations providing health care services to vulnerable populations by providing grants to 20 organizations across the Commonwealth, totaling \$265,000. Additionally, the Foundation provided \$20,000 in grants to four medical students and six resident physicians who will learn through international travel how to provide care in limited-resource settings.

Looking ahead I see persistent challenges in access to appropriate health care for the underserved and the most vulnerable patients in our communities. As physician leaders we are committed to filling major gaps in care and services in the Commonwealth, ensuring that people will get the health care they need and deserve.

Together, I know that we will continue to better the health and lives of people throughout the Commonwealth.

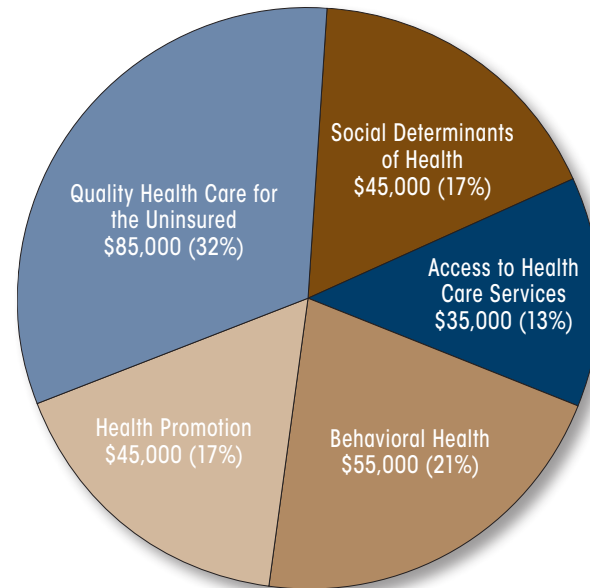

2018–2019 Regional Grants

This year, we supported 20 organizations for a total of \$265,000. These organizations help communities across the Commonwealth address current health issues while also improving health on a community-wide level. Our grantees this year include addiction recovery support programs, mental health counseling, homeless health care, among others. We are proud to share more information about these organizations in the following pages as they assist with our mission to support physicians, patients, and communities across Massachusetts.

2018–2019 Regional Grants

The Foundation made a significant impact in the Northeast Region, supporting 15 organizations for a total of \$195,000.

NORTHEAST REGION

Boston Health Care for the Homeless — \$25,000 to support the Women’s Health Initiative, a multi-faceted project that will mitigate the health disparities that homeless women endure through community-based engagement and trauma-informed services.

Charles River Community Health — \$10,000 to support collaboration between medical providers and community health workers to actively address the social determinants of health that affect their vulnerable patient population, including low-income immigrants, and improve their health outcomes.

Cotting School — \$5,000 to support the Seamark Vision Clinic, one of only a few clinics in Massachusetts with the specific technology and expertise to provide proper vision assessments to children with complex disabilities.

Health Care Without Walls — \$20,000 to create a replicable and sustainable model of low barrier access, community-based urgent and episodic care to support chronic disease management and prevent ER and hospital admissions among aging, homeless women.

Hearth — \$7,500 to support a part-time Substance Abuse Specialist who works with the elderly population in Hearth’s residences who are experiencing substance misuse and addiction to keep them in their homes without disturbing the other residents.

MetroWest Free Medical Program — \$10,000 to support enhanced volunteer recruitment and expanded capacity to meet the growing need for care by the uninsured and underinsured.

Peer Health Exchange Boston — \$15,000 to support the training of college volunteers to teach 9th graders at 21 partner schools where health education is lacking, or curriculum does not cover sexual health, mental health, or substance use.

Peer Health Exchange partners with high schools to provide high-quality health education over the course of the academic year, providing young people with critical health knowledge and skills to make and act on health decisions.

2018–2019 Regional Grants

The Family Van works to address the barriers to health and wellness that impact vulnerable populations by building relationships in a culturally sensitive and linguistically appropriate manner.

NORTHEAST REGION

REACH Beyond Domestic Violence — \$7,500 to support psycho-educational and skill-building groups that will increase access to mental health services for children and teens who have witnessed or experienced domestic violence or other trauma, some with limited English proficiency.

South Middlesex Opportunity Council — \$10,000 to educate homeless families in nutrition, healthy meal planning, and safe food preparation; with the overall goals of improving health, recovery, employability, and housing.

Sportsmen's Tennis & Enrichment Center — \$10,000 to support the HEAL2 program, a year-long health and wellness initiative designed to advance resident health and chronic disease prevention in Boston's Blue Hill Avenue Corridor.

StudentsCare — \$5,000 to support the Hospital Buddy Program that pairs pre-med college students with long-term pediatric patients and families to help address the emotional effects of long-term illness, while also promoting empathy and compassion among future health care professionals.

The Crimson Care Collaborative — \$20,000 to support the development of sustainable strategies to improve the safety of transitions to the community for individuals who leave Boston's jails each year at high risk for poor health outcomes.

The Family Van — \$20,000 to expand outreach to non-native English-speaking clients with multilingual staff, reference materials, community resource manuals, and trainings to increase cultural linguistically appropriate services.

The Sharewood Project — \$10,000 to support this entirely student-operated clinic, supervised by volunteer physicians, to provide free health care services to vulnerable populations.

Whittier Street Health Center — \$20,000 to support the Women's Opioid Prevention Program, an integrated treatment program to prevent the misuse of opioids by women; and to educate women, their families, and the community about the risks of opioid overdose.

2018–2019 Regional Grants

Four organizations in the Southeast Region received grants for a total of \$50,000.

SOUTHEAST REGION
Health Imperatives — \$15,000 to support the HIV Prevention Project by increasing access to HIV prevention services among high-risk populations in Southeastern Massachusetts through improved clinical outreach and community engagement efforts.
Gandara Center — \$10,000 to support the Brockton Champion Program, a community collaboration among city, police, courts, and health and treatment providers to provide immediate access to drug treatment in an effort to reduce the City of Brockton's opioid overdose and death rates and promote engagement with long-term recovery.
Father Bill's & MainSpring — \$15,000 to support the MainSpring Outreach Project, which creates access to health care and improves health outcomes for homeless men and women who are currently living outdoors in Brockton.
Interfaith Social Services — \$10,000 to support the New Directions Counselling Center, which addresses the mental health needs of impoverished people without health insurance or with inadequate coverage.

WEST CENTRAL REGION

Amherst Survival Center — \$20,000 to support the Health Program, which consists of a free clinic provided by medical volunteers and staff, a Health Needs Fund to help pay for medications and tests, and HungerRX: outreach to local physicians to support food security screenings and referrals to food pantry.

This past year marks the 17th consecutive year that the Foundation has awarded International Health Studies grants. The program began in FY 2002 with four annual grants totaling \$3,000 and has continuously grown to the past year awarding 10 grants totaling \$20,000. Ninety-four individuals have received this honor for a total investment of \$123,900.

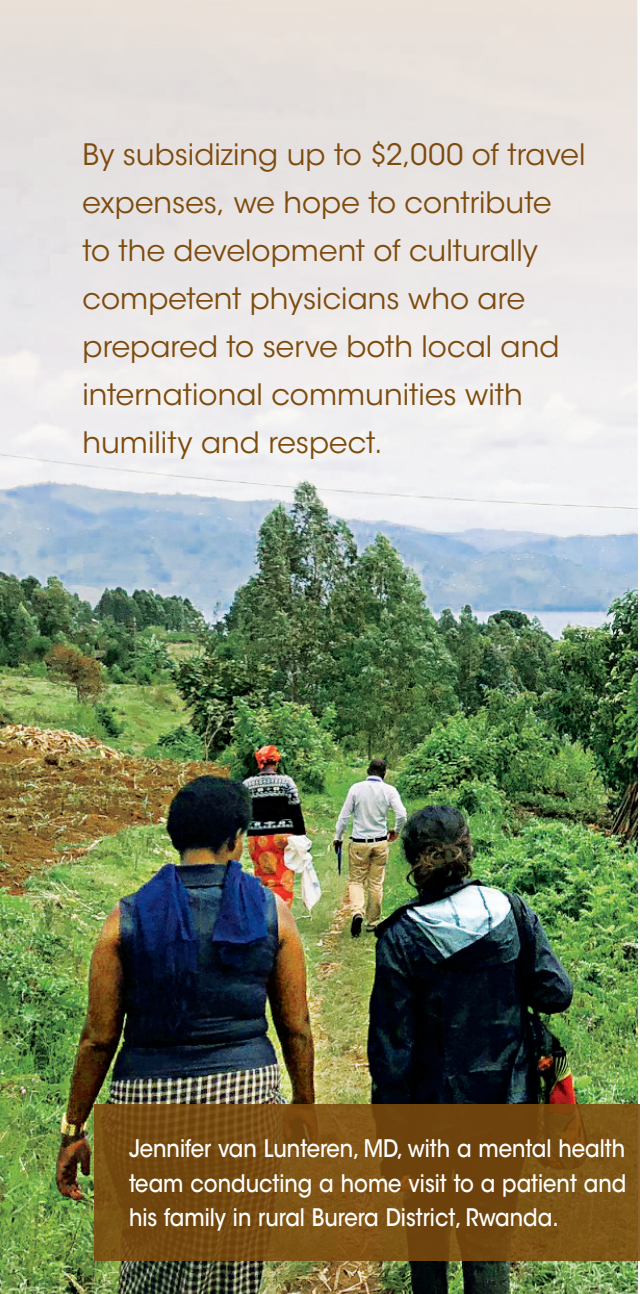

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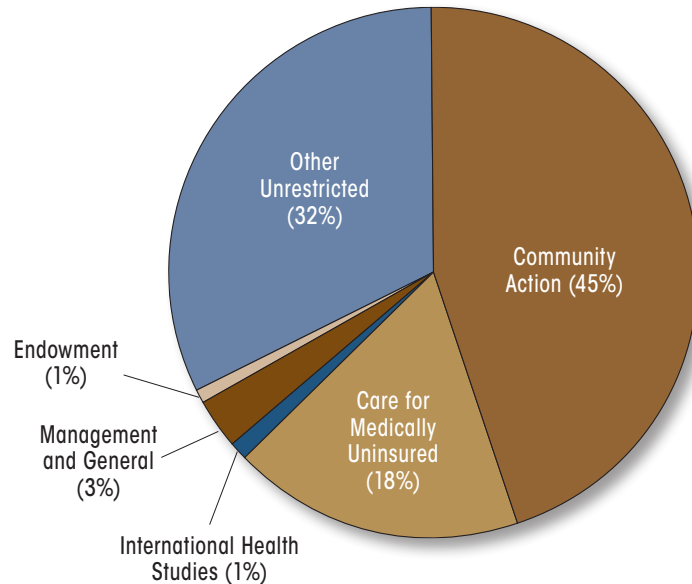

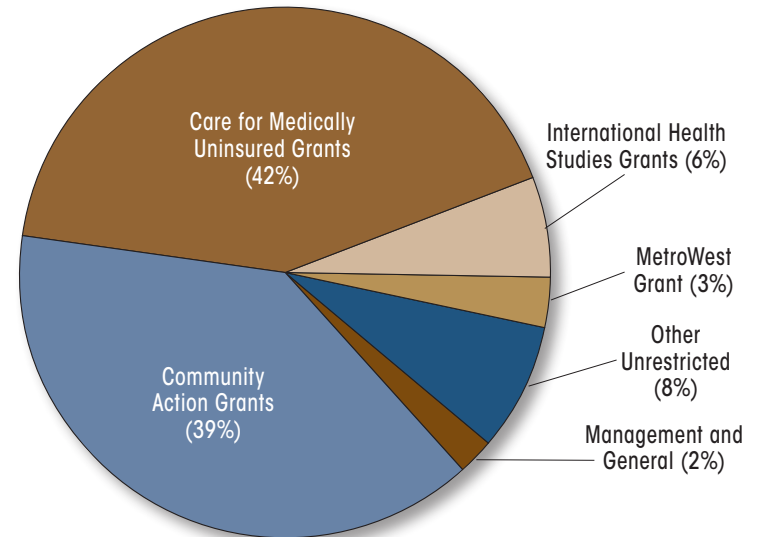
CONTRIBUTION REVENUE — FISCAL YEAR 2018

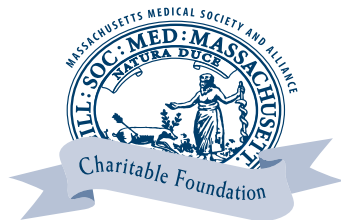
